








Tree Scavenger Hunt

The Park Patrol has lost some trees. Help find them by using the clues below. It is easiest when leaves are on the trees! Use the Exploration Kits brochure map for clues.

<p>Ginkgo: Leaves are shaped like fans. Round, yellow-brown fruit can be very smelly!</p> <p>FACTOID: It is the only modern tree that was around during the time of the dinosaurs.</p> 	<p>Chestnut: Tall, dome shaped tree. Grey-brown flaky bark gets gnarled and twisted. 5 or more leaflets on 1 leaf.</p> <p>FACTOID: Spiky green fruits are neat looking, but you can't eat them.</p> 
<p>Ash: This tall tree grows to 80 ft. 5-9 leaflets on one leaf. Beautiful fall color - from yellow to purple to red! Fruit is shaped like a helicopter propeller.</p> <p>FACTOID: Baseball bats are made from ash.</p> 	<p>London Plane: Very tall shade trees that can grow up to 100 ft. tall. The bark peels off, making it look like creamy camouflage.</p> <p>FACTOID: The leaves look like maple leaves and the tree looks like a sycamore tree.</p> 
<p>Catalpa: Giant, heart-shaped leaves. Long, string-bean shaped fruit. Blooms May to June (flowers are white with purple marks).</p> <p>FACTOID: The flowers of the Catalpa are a favorite of hummingbirds.</p> 	<p>Oak: Large, strong trees with wide branches that shade the sun. Can grow to 80 ft tall. Acorns are the fruit.</p> <p>FACTOID: Find the oak tree that came in 1936 from the home of the late President Madison.</p> 
<p>Crab Apple: This small tree has snowy flowers in May and June. Never more than 20 ft, this tree looks pretty in all seasons.</p> <p>FACTOID: If fruit is less than 2 inches it is a crab apple, if bigger, it's an apple.</p> 	<p>Sand Cherry: Purple-colored leaves with many leaflets on 1 leaf. Trees are small - staying under 10 ft. tall.</p> <p>FACTOID: Sweet smelling flowers bloom from late April to early May.</p>
